# 24-26 August Bank Holiday Pembroke South Roland Smith

If you have been to South Pembroke before, you will no doubt agree that it contains the best trad' limestone climbing in the UK. The Oread will be heading there for the August bank holiday this year, with the tides looking good for the weekend and the preceeding few days. If you haven't been before, then you are in for a treat.

As long as you are happy on VS's there will be enough classic routes to keep you busy for a first trip. It is better if you are a competent abseiler as there are limited opportunities for walking/scrambling to the bottom of the crag, but there are some. Most of the climbing takes place within the Castle-Martin firing range, but the MOD aim keep it open for the whole of August and the bird bans will have finished, so it is probably the best time to go.

It is a wonderful coastline for walking the sea cliffs, with the flora and fauna being improved by being closed to the public for most of the year. There are several decent cafes in Pembroke and good quality pasties are available in nearby Tenby.

We will be staying at the St Petrox campsite, on the way to Bosherston. It is fairly basic but it does have hot showers and decent washing up facilities. They didn't seem to want me to book, but they said that if I can turn up a few days before the weekend with a good idea of numbers then they will rope off an area for us, so please let me know if you intend to join us. We will probably arrive on the Tuesday or Wednesday beforehand.

The last time the Oread had a meet there, the most important facility of the campsite was a tractor to tow us all out of the mud, but we stayed there a few weeks ago and it was fine.



# John "Jack" Ashcroft 13 October 1931 - 22 May 2024

#### This tribute, compiled by David Ashcroft and the family, with the help of members of the several mountaineering clubs he belonged to, was read at Jack's funeral on 11 June.

Named as John but known by most as Jack Ashcroft was born on 13<sup>th</sup> October 1931 in Barrow in Furness. At the age of nine years old he, together with his mother and his younger sister Joyce, moved to Plealey near Shrewsbury after being bombed out of Liverpool during World War II. After finishing school, he went to the technical college in Shrewsbury and went on to qualify as a civil engineer. He worked as a civil engineer all of his life. He enjoyed his work but his true passion was what he called "the great outdoors." Walking, climbing, running, cycling, anything to get out in the open air.

While still at college he met his wife Janet and they enjoyed 64 years of

marriage together until she passed away in 2021. They began married life in a caravan, with a Bantam 125 motorcycle and a cat to their name. When Jack passed away, he was living in a five-bedroom house in a relatively affluent area of Sheffield. Despite this he was never interested in great wealth. As long as he could live close to nature, he was happy.

His passion for outdoor activity gained him respect and friendship from many people from the mountaineering world. He was involved in numerous mountaineering clubs and associations including the Oread Mountaineering Club based in Derby, The Castle Mountaineering Club in Sheffield, the Midlands Association of Mountaineers, the British Mountaineering Club, the Alpine Club and was a fellow of the Royal Geographic Society.

In 1961 he was part of an expedition to the Himalayas with the Oread Mountaineering Club. Led by his long-time friend Bob Pettigrew they made the second ever ascent of a mountain called the White Sail, a 22,000ft mountain in the Kulu region of Punjabi Himalaya. Jack took a bronze plaque that he hammered into the summit block. Bob told me that it was approximately 20 years until anyone else climbed the White Sail. Unfortunately, the third ascent was done by the Indian Airforce who decided to take the plaque down. Being a skilled cartographer, one of Jack's roles in the expedition was to be the first to survey and produce mountaineers' maps of the area.

In 1973 he was elected to the Alpine Club, to gain membership of this club you have to have led a minimum of 30 alpine peaks.

In the 70s he joined the Castle Mountaineering Club in Sheffield. With either the Oread or Castle clubs I believe he walked/climbed all the classic long-distance walks including the Pennine Way, Coast to Coast and the Welsh 14. He also completed all the Scottish Munros. There are very few mountains in the U.K. that he had not climbed. He returned to the Himalayas with the Castle club on a number of occasions for less severe climbs than the 1961 expedition. His last trip was to celebrate his 70<sup>th</sup> birthday.

He introduced his three sons to the mountains. While other families were going on holiday to the seaside, Jack would put his family into a car, drive to the lake district, Scotland, Wales, and on one occasion the Italian Alps. Put up a tent and spend a few weeks climbing mountains. They were introduced to skiing, canoeing and numerous other activities to enjoy in the "great outdoors".

While he spent as much time as possible in the mountains, he also ran a number of marathons including the Sheffield, London and a number of the Barnsley marathons. He was involved in numerous cross country runs and enjoyed cycling. He was also an enthusiastic photographer and loved growing his own veg. He often talked about becoming a vegetarian, but enjoyed his meat too much to succeed in that challenge.

He retired at the age of 63 but continued with his outdoor activities. In 2001, at the age of 70, he joined the County Set walking club, a local group of retired county engineers who shared his love of the peak district. He joined them for a number of local walks. Becoming more selective, choosing less strenuous walks as his age increased. Eventually just meeting what he called "the Lads" in the pub at the end of the walks.

Unfortunately, He had a fall in his late 80s while walking in the local area where he broke his neck. Being the resilient man he was he was back home within a couple of months. But a combination of the fall and his wife's death in 2021 took its toll. He spent his final few years at home being helped by family and friends with the odd outing at Christmas with people like "the lads" of the County Set.

Jack could be very stubborn. If you didn't want to do what he suggested or go his way he would, usually politely, agree to disagree and go his own way anyway. He spent his life doing what he loved, when and where he wanted to do it, as long as his wife would let him!

# **Rusty's Puzzle Corner**

#### This month's puzzle:

A great climbing pioneer suffered a minor fall whilst exploring a new route and later remarked that the fates had chosen a safe place to teach him a lesson. Who was the climber and what was the name of the route when later completed?

(This was a climb I have done myself and so was clearly not in the highest order of difficulty.)

#### Last month's puzzle solution:

The bridge with pedestrians aboard is the packhorse bridge North of Hollinsclough, over the River Dove, and the one with a full view of the arch is at Panniers Pool, and spans the River Dane.

Surprisingly, they are only 4.25 kilometres apart as the crow flies; (surprisingly because it would be a tortuous journey by road if undertaken). The waters of the Dove enter the North Sea via the Rivers Trent and Humber whereas the Dane enters the Irish Sea via the Mersey so the lovelorn molecules of water would only meet after an impossible distance through the worlds great oceans.

I find this of interest as it is on a major watershed.
