Tuesday 3 December 8.00pm Lecture Royal Oak Ockbrook

Six Oreads set out in Autumn 2023 on a campervan experience across France, through Italy, around Greece and then back again. The objective was to visit new places, climbing and walking with a bit of cycling and swimming thrown in. There was also an interest in food, wine and sightseeing. 25 crags were climbed on including Matera, Meteora, Manikia and Varasova along with La Rocchetta and Frosolone in Italy. The walking highlight was undoubtedly the Vikos gorge in the Pindus mountains. We visited archeological sites and wonderful cities. The evening will provide a taste of our adventure.

Wednesday 4 December The Little Grey Rabbit Walk Rob Tresidder

Departure: from Cromford Station as soon as the train arrives from Derby, a few minutes after 10.00am.

Getting there:

- by train from Derby, departs at 0935 and stops at 4 stations on the way
- by 6.1 bus from Derby, departs bus station at 0850, alight outside Greyhound Hotel, Cromford at 0947, cross A6, walk along Mill Lane to station or follow R bank of river below Willersley crag.
- plethora of buses (and train) from the north. Ask me if you need to know more.
- by car to Cromford Station CP. Parking charges apply.
- on foot, if you are holidaying in the delightful old waiting room (NB. No discount for Oasis fans).

The walk is short (6.2k) even by Wednesday short walk standards but steep. We will climb to Riber Castle then descend through Starkholmes to Matlock Bath, where the walk ends. I will probably have had enough by this stage but if some feel only lightly exercised I am happy to continue Northwards along the L bank of the river by the BMC approved "climbers' path" (flotation devices advised). Returns to start can be made via train, bus or on foot.

Thursday 12 December Short Walk Kniveton Ruth Gordon

We will meet in Kniveton at the junction of Ostrich Lane (leaves the main road by the school) and Longrose Lane where there is some parking. Otherwise park on the main road and walk the short distance to the meeting point. SK209 508. We will start at 11.00 am and follow the lane to pick up a bridleway leading us past Wigber Low then we take a footpath right to cross the Haven Brook and up over fields to Bradbourne where we can look at the weird ancient animals carved around the church door. We will return via the bridleway over Haven Hill. This is a relatively short walk, about four miles, sutable for the darkest days of the year.

Sunday 15 Dec Geo Walk Milldale – Wetton Mill Clive "Rusty" Russell

This being a one way walk I shall present myself with a vehicle at the car park adjacent to Wetton Mill Tea Room at 10.00 am, in the hope that others will leave a vehicle there and travel back to Milldale with me (the walk will then commence at 10 30am). We shall first take the footpath to the top of Cave Dale and then cross the road at Stanhope Grange, and thence to Wetton, the Manor house and Wetton Mill. Walking in an easterly direction along Darfield Lane we pick up the track that goes southerly along Square Plantation. Moving along the track to Basset Wood farm and then southerly to Cherry Orchard farm at Fenny Bentley.

Crossing the A515, past the church, a fairly steady incline of two halves takes us to the Tissington trail. Crossing the trail, we walk up to the pub and past the pub (controversial), passing Narlow Lane to join Spend Lane. Along here we join the Limestone way taking us to Washbrook Lane and ultimately a walk along the Avenue to return to the start point.

25 January Stanage Bouldering

Our first alpine trip of the year will be to the lovely 'Saastal' based at Camping Schönblick in the village of Saas Grund. It is the eastern region of the Swiss canton of Valais, north of the Monte Rosa group. There is a concentration of thirteen peaks exceeding 4000 metres that include technically easy normal routes along with some classic snow and rock ridge traverses. Half and full day walks are possible to a number of alpine huts, lakes and cols, which can include ascents of smaller walking peaks.

Tan yr Wyddfa Curry Meet 1 – 3 November Tony Howard

Twelve Oreads attended our Curry Meet on the Club's 75th Anniversary year. It was 24 years since our first Curry Meet.

Nick Evans and I went down on the Thursday afternoon. From Wrexham onwards we saw sunshine and brilliant blue skies, but immediately after Pen-y-Gwryd we were covered in dark grey clouds. This continued for the rest of the weekend, with one exception. See below. After unloading the food and our kit at the hut, we took on what might now be considered the standard short walk from the hut. We went south then round Llyn y Gors and through the forest to the main road. We crossed this and passed by Ffridd Uchaf farm to join the Rhyd Ddu path, which led us back to the hut: just over four miles. It was dark by the time we reached the hut.

I had seen a reference in the NT magazine to a Roman period round house at Dinas Dinlle and wanted to visit it. Nick had of course been there before. So, on Friday morning Nick and I drove to Dinas Dinlle and walked round the site which is positioned on a fortified hill above the beach.



After this we chose to visit the Iron Age fort on Tre'r Ceiri near Yr Eifl, at the eastern end of the Llyn peninsula. We set off from the main car park, which was southwest of our peaks, but I stopped short of the last ascent to the fort and returned to our parked car. Nick walked up Yr Eifl and got back to the car maybe 20 minutes after me. It's an interesting area and only the second time I had been there, though Nick had been there more often. The light was fading when we returned to Tan yr Wyddfa. However, we were welcomed by the lights of the hut. Helen and Mick Hayes had arrived, and Mick was already starting the lounge fire. They had been walking in Pembrokeshire!

Nigel and Janet, Angela and Roland, then Emma and Luke arrived later that evening. Kasia and Jurek with Luna, a beautiful white Alsatian, turned up next morning, though we didn't see Luna until later and then only in the car park.

On Saturday morning, Nick and I set out from Capel Curig along the old road running alongside the A5. After about three miles, we looked up at Galt yr Ogof trying to spot Dave Roscoe's two first ascent successes, but I couldn't identify them. We turned north towards Helyg and after lunch at a bridge, crossed the trunk road and went east along a path to Tal-y-braich-Uchaf; a National Trust property. Continuing in this line we ascended to a leat and followed this to a point just above the head of Llyn Cowlyd reservoir. I was tiring, Nick was waiting! Sorry Nick. We turned homebound, south on a wet and boggy path to Bron Heulog on the A5. The road led us back to our starting point: a total distance about seven miles.



The rest of our group walked up Snowdon via the south ridge in intermittent sunshine and swirling mists. That is until the last 50 metres of climb to the summit when they were treated to beautiful sunshine above a blanket of cloud. Then the mists caught up with them and provided a rare and beautiful Brocken Spectre, viewed from the summit. They descended using the Rhyd Ddu path over Llechog. Photo M. Hayes.

In the evening bottles were opened, and the wine and beer began to flow. Some showered and made themselves more presentable, smiles broadened and pre-cooked curries were warmed slowly. We chose to eat round the tables in the dining room, which was just possible with twelve of us. Cutlery and plates were laid out and the table decorated with red roses!! I really must be getting old. The Ice Crag Blues – Rjukan – 12 -19 March 2023 Steve Christian

Mid-March and there was an irony that early morning snow and ice covered the roads across the top of the peak district, as we accessed Manchester airport for a trip to Rjukan. The winter had waited until now to tempt us into the UK mountains, but we were committed to our journey. There was an expectation of snow-covered roads, but not both sides of the North Sea.

Thankfully the drive from Oslo Torp was in the late afternoon light, allowing us to relax a little driving with steel studded tyres on snow covered roads and soak up increasingly attractive views. We found a supermarket midway into the journey for the essential first food shop of the holiday and then further on, after two and a half hours driving time, stopped at Lake Tinnsja, one of the largest and deepest lakes in the country and Europe, as we neared Rjukan. We breathed in the fresh air and traced the ice lines on the cliffs high up on adjacent hill sides, noting their location for possible days out climbing.

We were booked into the self-catering accommodation Rjukan Hytteby, cabins that are copies of the first workers' houses built in Rjukan during the industrial revolution. Parking was the first challenge as driveways were obscured by huge mounds of ploughed snow. But the accommodation was perfect, a Norwegian style holiday chalet set on the outskirts of town. The adjacent pizza restaurant and water park were perfect near neighbours as we were to find later in the holiday.

For all of us it was our first visit to ice climb in Rjukan. For Ed, Rob, Sally and Tom it was the first visit abroad to climb water ice, whereas for me it was just shy of two decades. Guidebook swotting we whiled away the first evening, thankful to the efforts of the Oxford Alpine Club in publishing a recent printed version. Ed and Rob had booked a local guide for some first day instruction and

coincidentally we all ended up at the crag Krokan which, with easy access and single pitch climbs, is described as a modern ice crag.

It was the perfect starting venue to get used to swinging the ice tools, practicing cramponing on increasingly steep ground and placing ice screw protection. It was relatively quiet, due to it being later in the season, but the routes were really fat, the best conditions that local guide Bjorn reckoned he'd ever seen. It set us up well for the rest of the week.


By day two we were getting used to cleaning off the car in freezing morning light and driving on hard packed snow, made incredibly easy with metal studded winter tyres. Today's venue crag Ozzimosis, involved parking in a snowy layby on a hair pin bend on the road above Rjukan. Dropping over the Armco barriers on the outside of the bend led us down into a gully area, only a few hundred metres from the

road, where there was nothing but forest, silence and icefalls. The overnight snow had partially obscured the lines of the climbs and the wet snowy drizzle persisted all day. We made inroads into several single pitch water ice 3 climbs, marveling at the thickness and quality of the ice, thus building our confidence leading or seconding on steeper terrain. Most climbs were set up with slings and maillons on trees above so that the leader could be lowered off or parties could abseil without damaging the trees. We slowly became very damp as the wet snow drizzle continued all day and we left midafternoon happy with our combined efforts, back to a warm chalet to dry out the gear and ourselves. Passing through town and dropping into the local mini market to buy fresh produce, we discovered the hot food counter, discounted considerably around 5pm, the ideal post climb savory snack food. It was a treat that became a daily habit.

Getting the hang of the early starts and car clean off was now routine and day three we returned to Krokan. The crag being at the top of the valley means that on a sunny winters day the short walk down the access track and into the frozen river bed has a magical winter wonderland feel with views down the river valley below. Our initial set up was at the very top of the crag near to the three star classic WI5 climb Fyrstikkaa. Just to it's right a thin pencil vertical icefall had formed that wasn't pictured or described in the guidebook. It screamed at us to be climbed and we suspected from the fatness of many of the climbs that this was a rare if ever formed line. So, we climbed it, on top rope it has to be said, but never the less likely a first ascent. We lead the adjacent route Jomfrau and it's left hand variation both a steady WI4, swapping ropes to top rope each other's lines. Later we moved down the valley a little to climb the two variations of the classic three star WI3 climb Bullen, Tom taking the opportunity to get his first ever ice lead under his belt. The sun shone all day, so Norway's premier ice crag was elevated to glory status, with the day flowing easily even though the whole

place was frozen to a standstill.

The emergency services accompanied by army mountain rescue teams greeted us for day four as we parked at the Vemork Bridge. In choosing to climb in the upper gorge we had inadvertently turned up at the same time as a planned mountain rescue exercise. We were politely asked to park at the far end of the car park and keep clear of the climbing in the Vemork Bridge area. Stepping around the edge of the Armco we set off down through the trees into the frozen riverbed. We turned up stream towards the upper gorge, slowly being absorbed into the silence of the frozen river valley. As we walked further along the steep sides of the gorge grew leaving us with a restricted view forwards of steep exiting icefalls. Behind us the Vemork Bridge shrank away, even though it spanned the full width of the valley, finally disappearing as we rounded the first left hand bend. Apart from the sound of our own breathing it was eerily silent. Our breath condensed in the early morning air and we moved through the knee deep snow carefully placing feet as we followed the previous visitors buried trail, making sure to avoid any buried ice holes or pitfalls. We stopped in the lowest part of the valley to inspect the available ice falls and trudge up the through the snow fifty metres to the very wide ice fall of WI3 climb Nedre Svingfoss.

Wide enough for two independent lines to be climbed we geared up and set off simultaneously up a long single fifty metre pitch. We switched routes as the sun broke over the lip of the valley top and though it warmed it was still very cold. Further up the valley we moved on to climb the WI3 single pitch icefall By The Way before packing and returning back down the gorge in the dwindling light.

Our final day featured a return to the crag Ozzimosis. Ed had his eye on leading the single pitch three-star classic WI4 icefall of the same name but I seized the day and took advantage of growing confidence and pipped him to the start.

It's a steep start to the day but the week's build-up had put us in the right form physically and mentally so we both cruised it. We topped it off with the two pitch WI3 climb Farfoss, further down the crag, before realising that hands and feet had become just too cold for comfort to do anymore climbing that day. It's a good crag with some nice climbs but set in the forest on the edge of a steep reentrant it gets no sun and seems to be a particularly cold area, great of course for ice climbing!

Five days on the bounce ice climbing and we took the final day as a rest visiting the The Norwegian Industrial Workers Museum where they tell the story of hydroelectric power, the German's use of it in WW2 to make heavy water and the Telemark Heroes before finishing off with a relaxing afternoon at the local swimming pool, saunas and thermal pools. Well worth packing your swimming costume for.

Recollections of Dave Penlington Peter Amour

The first occasion I met Dave was in January, 1981. I was a raw new boy to the Oread MC and Colin Hobday was leading the 20 mile circuit of the Edale Skyline walk.

The weather was mixed, and when upon the southern edge of Kinder we were treated to a feisty squall of rain and sleet. I recall garbing up and pulling the hood strings in to exclude the worst excesses of the elements.

At this point I spotted someone in a red ventile jacket, again with the hood secured. Contained within the jacket was a gaunt ruddy face fringed with traces of white hair and matching moustache. I commented to myself "Blimey, what's this old bloke doing up here in these conditions?" Unwittingly, I had just met one of the fittest, toughest members of this club, founder member Dave Penlington. He was certainly not old, barely 50, my disrespectful assessment of the slim faced white haired man could not have been more wrong.

In May of that year Dave invited me to take part in the testing 14 Peaks walk in Snowdonia. We travelled together from his then home in Duffield. I shared the journey with his wife, Janet, her sister, and some other "old bloke" called Jack Ashcroft, goodness knows how five people plus gear fitted into the car.

The outline plan for Saturday was to drive around to Aber near the coast, and to trek the 14 3000ft summits back to TYW. Cars would be collected after completing the task. I was briefed

and ready, except I didn't expect the 4:30 am alpine start which Dave was to impose upon us. This came as something of a shock, the novice had a lot to learn!

At some time after 5:00am we set off in Dave's frost covered car. This irked me a little, the roads were icy, and Dave was in control of his car with only a small frost cleared port hole to peer through until the heating kicked in. We had an excellent start to the day, gaining the heights of the Carneddau in the early light. When on the ridge I began to experience ankle pain which ultimately led to my dropping out at Nant Peris, not so for Dave and Jack. They were to comfortably complete the event as if it was routine. Perhaps to them it was. The "old boys" had totally seen me off.

A year later Peno came up with idea of walking from TYW, summiting Cnicht, traversing the Moelwyns for a bivvy on the Rhinogs, and to reach Dolgellau at the end of the second day. As we, John Theobold, John Musket, and myself were by accident stood in a line looking like squaddies Dave walked past us. Eyeing this chaotic company, and in his clipped manner asked "Do you all have your cooking stoves and fuel?" We all nodded, he replied "Good, then I needn't carry mine then."

We made the Rhinogs after a demanding day with a superb sunset. John Theobold had found a secured tidy looking barn. He'd also found the key under the eves. We spent the night in the accommodation which turned out to be an Outward Bound hut.

Shortly after dawn we departed our shelter, the fine weather had too also departed. We were to experience driving storms for the whole day. I was *encouraged* by my "mate" to use my pristine new OS map in the wild conditions. On leaving the rougher terrain we trudged the final tarmac miles in very severe winds, taking turns at walking at the front to save energy. En-route we saw a road-side hotel, entered, and asked for beers all round. The young lady behind the bar said that this was a "dry" county on Sundays - no alcohol served on the Sabbath. Dave advised the barmaid that he was the Chief Constable, and that it would be alright. The youngster replied with her lilting Welsh accent "Oh no you're not, he comes in here regular". Coffees it was then...

We were collected in Dolgellau by John Muskett's wife Cath. During the return I commented that my new map was now ragged and ruined, Dave commented "It had been for a good cause."

It was always a pleasure to share days with Peno, his enthusiasm was infectious, his quiet determination impressive. When being greeted by him on the too few occasions after he and Janet moved north you felt warmly welcomed. Thank you Dave for sharing those great mountain days with me.

My condolences go to Janet, Roger, Nigel and the wider family at this difficult time.

Don Chapman

John Fisher recalls:

I was at school with Don but he was a couple of years older so we didn't have anything to do with each other then. The school was evacuated to Amber Valley Camp, Ashover during WWII- a first taste of the Peak District. I was only there a year, he got longer.

Later I thought of him as being a very good climber, in the style of Derrick Burgess, very good on his feet. I only recall climbing with him once, a route on Llewedd with Doug Cooke.

Dennis Gray writes:

I am sad at your news re Don Chapman.

I had not seen him for many a year but in the 1950's he was very active, and I met him several times on the Grit. I am brought very much by his death to how true Omar Khayam wrote that "the moving finger writes and moves on"!

Don was a member first of the Derby based Valkyrie club; after its demise he joined the Manchester based Rock and Ice in October 1951 and later joined the Oread in 1958. Other Oreads, Don Cowan, Nat Allen and Dennis Gray were his climbing companions through the late 1940s to mid 1950s.

Dennis writes: "I associate Don with the Peak edges."

With good reason - as a check of the first ascent lists in the BMC guides will reveal.

Don was on a number of first ascents on the southern gritstone edges: his own leads included: at **Froggat** – 1948 Turret Crack; many of the early ascents at **Yarncliffe** 1950-52 including Cardinal's Crack and Arete, both VS. On **Curbar** 1948 Campion Groove, 1954 Overtaker's Buttress. **Gardoms** 1951 Babylon's Groove. **Chatsworth** Strangler's Groove, Strangler's Crack, Throttled Groove, Noser and Zizag Finish. He was in the party on many more first ascents on these edges usually with Nat Allen and/or Joe Brown,

He also ventured onto limestone: at Stoney Middleton in 1950 he was on the first ascents of Golden Gate with Joe Brown, Slim Sorrell and Nat (with a left hand finish – they originally named it Valkyrie), and Morning Crack with Joe Brown.

Don was not just a gritstone climber however:

In Dennis Gray's **Rope Boy** (published 1970) Dennis recounts a rescue attempt on Tower Ridge in 1954 (sadly the climber did not survive) After a big day out the

call for helpers came and one team set off to attempt to reach the fallen climber via Tower Gully while Dennis set out with Don Whillans, Joe Brown, Slim Sorrell and Don Chapman to get to the top of Tower Ridge. Brown and Whillans, belayed by the rest of the party, on ropes tied together, descended to Tower Gap. The body was recovered after much difficulty.

"While this was going on, Slim, Don Chapman and I up on the summit plateau were in danger of becoming exposure victims. We had no means of communication with those below so, after cutting ice bollards and anchoring the ropes to these, we found refuge by tunnelling into the ruins of the observatory, buried but accessible under the snow. The night seemed endless; we had no food and the cold bit deeper and deeper as the hours slowly ticked by until we couldn't keep still for a moment."

These small glimpses into the character of the man will, hopefully, be filled out in a more balanced tribute in our next issue.


