## Wednesday 5 June Alstonefield Walk Clive Russell

We shall assemble on foot opposite the car park and toilet block in Alstonfield (I suggest you share vehicles where possible, not only because the Peak Park are now charging extortionate fees for their car parks but also to leave space for others).

I propose to set off at 10.30 am so a 10.15 arrival would be good. The plan, subject to adjustment depending on the weather and the state of the party, is to take the Eastern bank of the Manifold, downstream as far as Castern Hall and then down to Ilam from where we will nip up Bunster and then head vaguely North before descending through the wood to Ilam Rock. A few short strides up the valley will take us to Milldale and a comfortable rising path back to the departure point.

Rather than quoting distances and rise and fall in metres or even poles and perches, I shall undertake to adjust the journeying so that no one is exerted to an undue extent. Anyone requiring a lift from Parwich can text me, xxxxxxxxxx (first three requests accepted).

## 13 June Cratcliffe – Youlgreave short walk Ruth Gordon

#### Note date change - a week earlier than usual.

We will meet at the point where the Limestone Way meets the B5056 below Cratcliffe Tor SK228 618. There is a layby and roadside parking just a little down the road. We will follow the Limestone Way gently uphill past Robin Hood's Stride to Cliff Lane then through woodland and fields downhill into Youlgreave. Here we will follow the beautiful riverside path almost to Middleton before cutting back south east. There is a bit of an uphill plod alongside a campsite but the views from the top are worth the effort. Then it's field paths to Elton where we pass the church and take another field path to Dudwood Lane and back to our starting point. This is about seven miles - a bit longer than our usual Thursday walks – but through very beautiful scenery. We will take our time and enjoy it at leisure. This section of the walk is in limestone country, apart from a brief excursion on to the overlying sandstone and shale around Harthill Moor. Typical White Peak scenery is first encountered in Bradford Dale, closely followed by Lathkill Dale with its crystal-clear river.

The steep path up from the river to reach the limestone plateau provides the only significant climb of the day.

The other is longer, up to Arbor Low/Gib Hill, an extra 45 minutes. We will consider this as group.

#### In Search of the Bullstones Cabin Janet Briggs

In early 2023 Nigel and I agreed to lead the July weekend walk, with a venue of our choice. After some thought we decided on a walk from Fairholmes car park, above the East side of the reservoirs, coming down to Slippery Stones for a late afternoon dip in the river, enjoying the summer sunshine and warmth. Our chosen route took in Lost Lad and Margery Hill before dropping down Cut Gate to Slippery Stones.

We decided on a recce in late May, which doubled up as a chance to test out the weight of our proposed rucksacs and contents before embarking on the Tour du Mont Blanc a couple of weeks later. 24<sup>th</sup> May was a beautiful day, the sun was out, the birds were singing and the sky was blue. Having got to Margery Hill we decided to detour and come down past the Bullstones Crag and see if we could see any signs of the famous but now burnt down cabin.

We had picked up a grid reference (SK179961) and that there was a spring near it. We spent some time wandering around above and below the 'stones' but could not see anything which looked likely. However the afternoon was rounded off with a lovely swim before walking back to our car at Fairholmes.

Having seen our Oread newsletter pre walk write up of the walk, mentioning the possibility of detouring to try to find the site of the Bullstones Paul Bingham got in touch, telling us:

Despite having visited the foundations (it was burnt down by vandals in the mid 60s) in the 1970s with Harry Pretty et al, I and several others were unable to find the site when we scattered Gordon Gadsby and George Reynolds ashes in 2016 (I think). We intended to scatter them at the cabin site but had to make do with Bull Stones rocks.

Paul also alerted us to an article, found by googling, from the Mountain Bothies Association:

It includes an article by Keith R J Deary entitled 'Cabining' in which he states that:

'my first experience of cabining. Bullstones Cabin (SK179961) was the place we chose, just below the gritstone outcrop of that name, near to the where the Cut Gate drops down into the Derwent Valley (and now disappeared without trace – even the spring is clogged up and hard to locate) '

This fits with our experience on our recce walk of finding no trace.

Fast forward a couple of months to July 2023 and our lovely summer walk turned out to be a day with a very 'iffy' forecast, with showers and blustery winds at best, and a few of the proposed participants dropped out at the last moment. However a team of seven joined Nigel and me, and as described in the October 2023 Newsletter the weather was not as bad as forecast, and the wettest part for some came not from the rain but from a dip in the river.

Brian West, was one of those on the walk, and he informed us that the Bullstones Cabin site was not at the Grid Reference given in the MBA article, below the rocks, but was in fact on the other side of Broadhead Clough. We followed Brian through shoulder high bracken, some of the

party abandoned before crossing the stream, some followed to the other side but the site was not found amongst the vegetation.

At that stage we decided it would be good to go back on a clear crisp day in winter when there was no vegetation. Peter Amour expressed an interest in joining Nigel and me, and if we went mid week we could drive up the valley further cutting down the length of the walk and giving more time for searching. Closer examination of the Dark Peak Explorer map showed two small square structures near Lord Edward Howard's Spring, above Broadhead Clough. (These structures, south of the spring, are not marked on the 1924 6 inch scale map reproduced below.)

Interestingly the Deary article mentioned:

'another that was visited regularly because of its excellent spring is in the Derwent Valley at SK172693, marked on the OS as Lord Edward Howard's - I certainly remember a good cabin there, but I never slept in it. '



Well we all know the winter of 2023/24 was not noted for anything crisp and clear, or indeed anything other than wet with the ground being completely saturated. By mid April things were occasionally looking up and the forecast for my birthday (16<sup>th</sup>) was half decent so we decided to go and have a look before the bracken started growing. Unfortunately Peter was seriously laid up with a bad chest infection so could not join us.

We walked upstream from Slippery Stones, past the bottom of Broadhead Clough to an area marked as Oaken Bank on the map.

There was then a reasonable path that headed back up the hillside towards the top end of Broadhead Clough and appearing to pass the two square structures on the map. The first of these, at SK171963 was clearly the remains of a cabin, with visible stone walls but no roof.

We then continued along the path to Lord Edward Howard's Spring, expecting to find a second structure. The spring was obvious, gushing water in several places and giving a general damp boggy platform, before a rivulet descended the hillside between trees. However there was no obvious structure, we went higher, finding a shooting butt, and further along before returning to the boggy ground by the spring. Eventually we detected what looked like a rectangular base, built up on the downhill side to make it level. The middle of this rectangle contained a small 'puddle' inhabited by tadpoles.

This was not entirely convincing and certainly as of April 2024 does not look an inviting dry site for a cabin, however we later compared a photo taken from that spot, looking back at the stone walled ruins, with the Jack Ashcroft photo...

On this basis we are pretty sure we have found the site of the Bullstones Cabin (or Cabins). Thank you to Paul Bingham, Brian West, Peter Amour and our other companions on the July 2023 walk. And respect to Jack Ashcroft, veteran of so many hard walking days and cabin nights – our inspiration.

## Rusty's Puzzle Corner

#### This month's puzzle:




Consider the two bridges illustrated, both traversed by Oread walkers at different times, By what distance are they separated and where would the waters flowing through meet?



#### Last month's puzzle solution:

My solution is that the course involves two lateral traverses (as drawn) and one longitudinal. Thus the total distance is 4m lateral and 3m longitudinal, total distance by Pythagoras 5 miles, hence target time 40 mins. As I see it, the 3/4 factor is the tangent of the angle between the base line and the



shortest path for the runners If this is drawn showing the mirror images of the actual path. If this image is a straight line then the path is of course the shortest possible distance.

Snod provided a colourfully expressed but incorrect answer – he got it right at the second attempt – his excuse being that he had used a Pythagoras Calculator App that he found on his phone – doing it longhand provided the correct answer.

#### Rusty's response:

"These apps are supposed to be written by geniuses for idiots but it's often the other way round."

At the 11<sup>th</sup> hour a second, most erudite answer was received from **Roger Larkam:** 


"Having quickly discarded rather extreme ideas such as running 7+ miles via the SW and SE corners & then to the finish, surely one would Intuitively, head to somewhere around one third up the eastern boundary, similarly then to about 2/3 up the opposite boundary, and thence to the finish. It turns out that this is not the shortest.

Consulting **Theon Heron** of Alexandria and his Euclidian works we are reminded that this problem can be solved by a geometric reflection. A generalised representation of the runners path is shown in the diagram (in green). The second traverse of the moorland area, **EW**, can be represented by **EW2** where |EW|=|EW2| (ie the vector **EW** is reflected about a N-S axis through point E). Similarly the third traverse of the moorland, **WF**, can be represented by **W2F2** (ie vector **WF** but commencing at point W2). Thus a path S-E-W2-F2 has been constructed with the same length as S-E-W-F. It can be seen therefore that the shortest path to the finish is represented by **SF2** (blue). Using Pythagoras' theorem the length of SF2 is spookily just the

square root of the sum of the squares of 4 and 3, ie 5 miles. Using the speed of 8 minutes per mile this means that the estimated time of the Event Favourite would be 40 minutes.

This solution makes no allowance for curvature of the earth or undue tussocks, but of course can be reflected to take in the western boundary first, with the same solution.

Attempts to derive a generalised equation from a direct pythogorithian solution to lengths of the 3 elements of the route all failed me. The binomial expansion of the sum of the 3 square roots suggests a quartic equation but doesn't converge – any suggestions here?"



Rusty has responded and the correspondence continues – but your Hon. Ed. has lost the will to live.

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
